### **BATOD representing the profession**

During this year the BATOD National Executive Council (NEC) has reviewed its membership to ensure that its ruling body represents the range of roles and settings of Teachers of the Deaf current in the four countries of the UK. In particular, we have arranged a co-opted place on the NEC for teachers in training to be qualified ToDs. This means that the course providers encourage one or two of the trainee ToDs to come to NEC meetings to be the voice of those in training and in their very early years in the profession. This is working well and one such member has since joined the NEC by being elected in her own right.

We have also ensured that the NEC contains representatives from the course providers, the cochlear implant centres, Deaf ToDs, post-16 ToDs through a representative of their own professional body, adept, and educational audiologists.

### **BATOD conference 2019**

After the success of the Manchester conference we have decided to have another two-day conference. This time it is in Manchester and will take place in March. The theme will be “Deaf education, past, present and future”. Keynote speakers will be Dr Sue Gregory who will be talking about the development of the deaf history element of our website, Ian Noon from NDCS, Dani Sive from Frank Barnes School and Wendy McCracken who, although she has retired and is working on her own conference in June to celebrate 100 years of research in deaf education in June, is giving another keynote looking at the sweep of developments she has seen during her career and the lessons for the future to be derived from it.
